# Evidence for Faith

### A Study of the Gospel of Luke, Part Two Lesson 23

- ➤ Read Luke 23:44—24:12.
- ➤ Reread Luke 23:44-49.
- 1. As the passage begins, Jesus is hanging on the cross, and Luke tells us that "the sun stopped shining" (23:45) from noon to three in the afternoon during the time that Jesus suffered under the weight of the sins of mankind. What do you think the unnatural physical darkness represents spiritually?

## Three Hours of Darkness

Given the phase of the moon and the duration of the darkness, this could not have been a naturally occurring event like an eclipse.

- 2. The sun is not the only thing to bear witness to Jesus' suffering.
  - a. What happens in the temple at Jesus' death? (23:45; Mt. 27:51a)
  - b. What does this represent? (Heb. 9:11-15, 25-28; 10:19-22)
- 3. What do Jesus' last words show? (Jn. 10:14-18; 1 Pet. 2:23)

## Jesus' Final Words

"Normally a person in the last stages of crucifixion would not have the strength to speak beyond a weak groan, but each synoptic Gospel says that Jesus spoke with a 'loud voice' (v. 46)."

Jesus uses the last of his strength to testify to his relationship to the Father.

4. In Luke 23:46, Jesus quotes Psalm 31:5. This would have held deep significance for the Jews that heard him because it "was actually a bedtime prayer used by Jewish children." What kind of faith does Jesus demonstrate by what he says to God the Father? (Lk. 18:16–17)

14. As things unfolded following Jesus' crucifixion, there was much confusion and fear because as Luke says, "[t]he disciples did not understand any of this. Its meaning was hidden from them" (Lk. 18:34). And remember they were in deep mourning having just seen their friend and Lord killed in the most gruesome manner. Nonetheless, prophecy **had** been fulfilled and Jesus' death **had** satisfied God's justice. Read Hebrews 10:19–25 below and underline the privileges Jesus' death has purchased for you. Take time to respond in prayer asking the Lord to help you enjoy the benefits of his sacrifice.

#### Hebrews 10:19-25:

<sup>19</sup> Therefore, brothers, since we have confidence to enter the holy places by the blood of Jesus, <sup>20</sup> by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain, that is, through his flesh, <sup>21</sup> and since we have a great priest over the house of God, <sup>22</sup> let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. <sup>23</sup> Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful. <sup>24</sup> And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, <sup>25</sup> not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near.
