## **Peace and Its Backstory**

Isaiah 9:6-7

"Peace I leave with you. My peace I give to you." –Jesus (John 14:27)

- [1] Peace, in the **simple** sense: peace means no violence, no war.
  - From the moment Cain killed Abel (Genesis 4), human peace has been temporary, fragile, and elusive.
  - By the time of Noah, "the earth was filled with violence" (Genesis 6:11).
  - God's judgment through the flood ends with signs of peace: a dove, an olive branch, and a promise of divine patience with sinful humanity. (Genesis 8:11, 21-22)
  - But human violence continued, as the Old Testament describes in many places.
- [2] Peace, in the **comprehensive** sense: *peace of mind*. This can also extend further to mean *harmonious relationships, prosperity, and complete well-beina*.
  - "You keep him in perfect peace [lit. *shalom-shalom*] whose mind is stayed on you, because he trusts in you." (Isaiah 26:3; see also 32:17, 48:18-22)

- [3] Peace, in its **messianic** accomplishment:
  - "For to us a child is born...and his name shall be called...Prince of Peace... Of the increase of his government and of peace there will be no end." (Isaiah 9:6-7)
  - How so? Through a sacrificial death: "But he was pierced for our transgressions; he was crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the chastisement that brought us peace [shalom]." (Isaiah 53:5)

## To the Lord's Supper: Peace Offering

• "Peace offerings," from the word *shalom*, were the only ones the worshipers could <u>eat</u>. (Lev 7:15) They provided immediate strengthening and table fellowship. Same for the Lord's Supper!

## **Questions for Reflection and Application:**

- 1. Why is "peace" used in so many popular greetings—in both the Bible and contemporary society? Does this say anything about us?
- 2. What is the key to peace of mind according to Isaiah 26:3? How and why is this true?
- 3. The Messiah was called to be called the "Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9:6) Explain this title, and what it means for us and the future.
