The importance of being centered

Luke 24:13-32: The greatest Bible study ever

- "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the Scriptures?"
- Jesus is saying this is what the Old Testament Scriptures are about: His suffering and glory. It's about Him. Even if you can't see it at first.
 - \circ $\;$ And it's easy to see this is what the New Testament is about also!

The Bible is Christ-centered. Or we could say Gospel-Centered. What does that mean?

• The Gospel of Jesus Christ is the main message, the point of the Bible. (John 5:39-40)

• Also, Christ is the protagonist, and his death and resurrection are the climax of the story. (Matthew 26:53-54, 5:17-20)

If Jesus says that Scripture is Gospel-centered, then we should be too, right?

- 1. New Life conviction: Christians need the gospel, too! (1 John 3:19–20, 2 Peter 1:8-9, Gal. 3:1–4)
- 2. But unfortunately we can be centered on other things...
- 3. Finally, what Christ-centered or Gospel-centered *doesn't* mean

Questions for Reflection and Application

- 1. Read Luke 24:13-32.
 - a. Jesus could have said the Old Testament Scriptures were about Israel, or God's_salvation. These answers would sorta make sense.
 So why was Jesus' answer so_surprising? (Admittedly, it helps to be familiar with the Old Testament for this_question.)
 - b. Why would this conversation result in a burning heart? (Luke 24:32)
- 2. Why is it important for a Christian to be centered on the Gospel of Christ? Consider an_alternative center—or no center at all.
- 3. "Christians need the gospel, too." Explain how this is true. See 1 John 3:19–20, 2 Peter_1:8-9, Gal. 3:1–4.
