One Savior and Mediator

1 Tim 2:5; Exodus 3: 9-22, 32: 7-14

Series review: The Number One. There is only One God, and only one creature made in His image (i.e. humanity).

 Today: there is only one Savior, one Mediator. (John 14:6, Acts 4:12, 1 Tim 2:5)

History is the History of God's Salvation!

• Broadly speaking, in Scripture God's salvation moves from the *external* to the *internal* and finally to the *eternal*.

(1) External

- Some of our problems are external– including enemies against us
 - God's salvation of Abraham and Israel from its (external) enemies would occur many times, supremely in the exodus from Egypt. See Gen 12:3, Exodus 3:9-22, etc.
- People may wrong you deeply, it's true. God takes this seriously.
 - o Is this our deepest problem though? No, as Israel's history soon reveals...

(2) Internal

- Blaming God after the Exodus: problems with the human heart
 - "For you have brought us out of this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger!" (Exodus 16:3, see also 15:24, 17:1-3)
 - "If I just saw great miracles, I would believe, I would obey." Are you sure?

- What's the solution? The (surprising) emergence of a mediator between God and sinful man. See Exodus 32:7-14, 33:17.
 - Moses the mediator turns away God's anger!
 - Which means low self-esteem isn't our deepest problem.
 - Other mediators: prophets, priests, and kings
 - They succeeded in some ways (2 Kings 17:13, Ezek 48:11, 1 Kings 3), and they failed, too (Jer 14:14, Lev 10:1-3, 2 Kings 17:21-22).

(3) Eternal

- But God's plan was that these point to the effectiveness of a mediator, but also the need for a greater mediator, a *final* and ultimate mediator: "For there is one God, and there is one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus." (1 Tim 2:5)
 - O You might say this is the theme verse for this series!
 - o Jesus is the prophet, priest, and king that we need. See John 6:68, Hebrews 4:14-16, John 18:36.
- And he's the greater Moses, who was rejected when he offered himself as a substitute for his people (Ex 32:31-34). Only a perfect mediator could do that.

Questions for further reflection and application:

- 1. Read Exodus 32-34. Note Moses' amazing role as mediator, and what God is teaching us about the efficacy of a mediator.
 - A. Yet Moses falls short. Consider 32:31-34, as well as Deuteronomy 32:51–52.
 - B. How does Christ exceed Moses as the mediator we need?
- 2. How does Scripture redirect our attention to our biggest problems that we need salvation from? Is this true for you? Describe it.
